

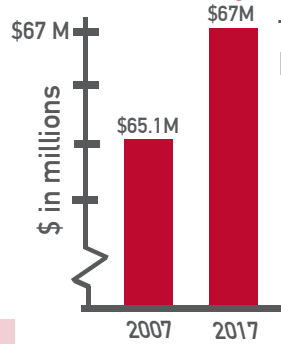


DENVER PUBLIC SAFETY

Public Safety includes Police, Fire, Sheriff and Safety Programs

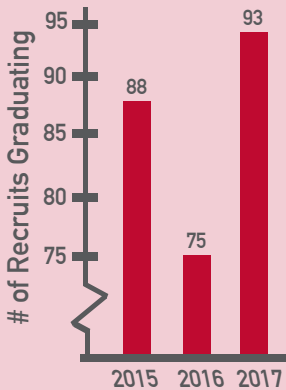
Bond Funding for Public Safety



The 2017 GO Bond includes \$67 Million for Public Safety improvements including:

- County Jail Improvements
- Fire Station at 72nd & Tower Road
- Fire Station Restrooms and Kitchen Upgrades
- Improvements to Police Department Buildings
- Police District 5 Replacement
- Police District 6 Replacement

Number of New Police Officers



The 2017 budget included \$4.4 M to **add 48 Police Officers** and vehicles. The 2018 budget **increases the number of uniformed officers by 22** to keep pace with population growth. Additionally, more crime report technicians are included in the 2018 budget to free up officers for proactive policing.

Bump Stock Ban

On January 22, 2018 City Council passed Bill 17-1400 to change the Denver Revised Municipal Code (D.R.M.C.) 38-130. This bill makes bump stocks illegal to sell, carry, store, or otherwise possess in Denver.

If Denver residents are in possession of a bump stock, and would like to turn-in their bump stock to the Denver Police Department, they can do so at any Denver Police Station to be safely destroyed without penalty. Anyone in Denver who is charged in possessing, selling, carrying, or storing a bump stock, will be subjected to a fine and/or incarceration.

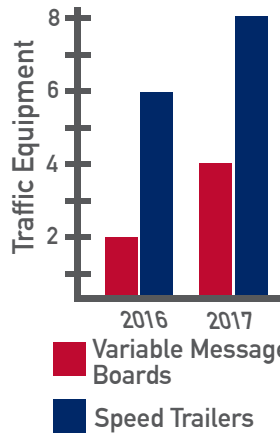

Traffic Control Equipment



Denver Police Department has a menu of tools to enforce areas that have recurring speeding issues. As of 2018, their equipment includes 8 speed trailers, 4 variable message boards, 7 pole mounted speed detection devices and 4 StealthStat boxes that can collect vehicle data from a pole mounted box.
